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

Tracing the continuum from bad to worst, it moves from online communicators' pet peeves to increasingly disinhibited virtual conduct, all the way to down- right toxic behavior. Vivid examples of actual cases are provide along the way. The session concludes with class activities that train students in respect and cooperation, plus some classroom management tips that will enhance your instructional atmos- phere.
